Elected positions

The Chair-Elect serves the Section for three years: one year as Chair Elect, the next year as Chair, and the following year as immediate Past Chair. Typically the Chair calls meetings of the Executive Committee, runs meetings of the section (dinner meetings or other programs), appoints members to other committees, and coordinates Section activities. The Chair is also responsible for an annual report to national ACS staff on Section activities during his or her year as Chair. The Chair Elect has an opportunity in January to attend (at ACS expense) a weekend ACS Leadership institute with other section officers from around the country. The Chair Elect also plans section activities for his or her Chair year. Both the Chair Elect and Past Chair assist the Chair in coordinating Section activities. The Chair Elect, Chair, and Past Chair also serve as members of the Nominations and Elections committee. Because the position of Chair Elect is currently vacant, we must elect both a Chair and Chair Elect this fall.

The **Secretary** takes minutes of Executive Committee meetings, reports election results to the national ACS, and is generally responsible for formal communications on behalf of the Section. The term of the Secretary is one year, and the Secretary may be re-elected.

The **Treasurer** is responsible for budgeting, handling the Section's funds, and paying its bills. The term of the Treasurer is one year, and the Treasurer may be re-elected.

The Councilor represents the Syracuse Section at national meetings of the ACS Council. The Councilor is part of the governance system of the national organization and is also a member of the Section's Executive Committee. Typically the Councilor attends the national meetings (at ACS expense) of ACS to attend the meeting of the Council and other governance meetings. The Alternate Councilor is a member of the Section Executive Committee, and he or she attends the national Council meeting if the Councilor cannot. The Alternate Councilor will be the runner-up in the election for Councilor. The term of the Councilor and Alternate is three years (2012-2014).

The Executive Committee has four **Delegate positions** without specified duties other than to participate as voting members in deciding Section business and to assist in tasks as needed. In order to encourage participation from all areas of the Section, two delegates must live or work outside Onondaga County; the other two may be from anywhere in the Section. Delegate is an entry-level position in Section governance and service. Under the new Section bylaws, delegate terms are two years (with re-election possible), and two Delegates would be elected each year. In order to get the Delegates in place, all four Delegate positions are up for election this year: two for two-year terms (2012-13) and two for one-year terms; one of each must be from outside Onondaga County.

Candidate for Chair

Bill Ayling

Bill is an environmental consultant with over 20 years of experience. In 2010, he began Integrated Science, LLC which provides consulting services to help organizations to meet environmental and sustainability challenges. Bill is a graduate of SUNY Albany with a degree in Biology and Syracuse University with a master's degree in Environmental Engineering. Bill has been a member of ACS for nearly 24 years and currently serves the Syracuse Section of ACS as Chair of the Sustainability/Public Relations Committee and as the Appointed Chair-Elect. Bill was one of the Syracuse ACS organizers of the SUNY Oswego Sustainability Fair that received two Chemluminary awards from National ACS last summer. He is also the organizer of Syracuse ACS participation in Green Drinks. He is an ACS Chemistry Ambassador and Science Coach. Locally, Bill is also actively involved in the Otisco Lake Preservation Association as a technical advisor and grants manager, and a founding member of the Advocacy Committee of the Upstate NY Chapter of the US Green Building Council. Neal Abrams

Dr. Neal Abrams is a faculty member in the department of chemistry at SUNY ESF. He obtained his bachelor's degree in chemistry and certification in teaching from Ithaca College, completed his doctorate at Penn State University, and was a postdoctoral researcher at Cornell University. At ESF, Neal instructs the general chemistry labs, co-teaches a course in renewable energy, and directs a chemistry research program centered on renewable energy.

Neal is an appointed member of the Younger Chemists Committee, an official ACS Committee and serves as the chair of the Communications subcommittee for the group. At the local level, Neal has been recently appointed the interim Education Chair and National Chemistry Week leader for 2011. He worked as a post-doctoral researcher on the total synthesis of heterocyclic compounds and molecular machines under the guidance of Dr. Ross Kelly at Boston College. In 2006, Dr. Damkaci joined the faculty at SUNY-Oswego, where he currently teaches organic chemistry, medicinal chemistry, and nanomaterials.

Dr. Fehmi Damkaci is the director of graduate program director, co-chair of general education reform task force, and the director of GENIUS Olympiad (www.geniusolympiad.org). He was the co-chair of the organic chemistry symposium at NERM 2010 conference. He is also the director of "high school summer science immersion research program" designed for inner-city high school students. In addition, he also serves on the chair of a public school board and the founder and the chair of a non-profit education and science organization.

Dr. Fehmi Damkaci will increase the programs at local high schools and each college campus that ACS-Syracuse section serves. He will support the new programs organized by chemistry departments to increase the awareness about chemical sciences among high school students. His experience with program development and organization at both college and high school level will increase the visibility of ACS-Syracuse section not only in Syracuse but in all districts that ACS-Syracuse section serves.

Kestutis Bendinskas

Dr. Kestutis Bendinskas is Associate Professor of Biochemistry in the Department of Chemistry at SUNY-Oswego. He graduated in 1991 with a Chemistry Engineer degree (Environmental Science track) from Mendeleev University of Chemical Technology in Moscow, Russia. He received his Ph.D. in Photochemistry from Bowling Green State University in Bowling Green, Ohio, in 1995, under the tutelage of Dr. Robert William Midden. After his postdoctoral studies with the renowned Dr. Lawrence Grossman in the Department of Biochemistry at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, Maryland, he directed Bioorganic and Biochemistry labs at the University of Notre Dame in South Bend, Indiana, for 4 years. After two years as Assistant Professor in the Department of Physical Sciences at Kutztown University in Pennsylvania, in 2003 Dr. Bendinskas joined the faculty at SUNY-Oswego, where he currently teaches Biochemistry and Environmental Science.

Dr. Kestutis Bendinskas is Northeast Sigma Xi Associate Director and Symposium Coordinator, Director of the Mass Spectrometry and Proteomics Center at SUNY-Oswego, and primary editor of the Biochemistry section of the American Journal of Undergraduate Research. His current research is about lead- and mercury-induced changes in the human proteome. He participates in education research by developing new biochemistry and proteomics teaching laboratories. He actively engages young minds in these activities—his six publications in 2010—2011 include eleven student co-authors.
